Payment at Maturity:	Payment at maturity will be based on the price performance (or "Percentage Change") of the Index measured from the Initial Index Level to the Final Index Level. The amount payable (the "Redemption Amount") on each \$100 Principal Amount per Security at maturity will be determined as follows:
	If the Percentage Change in the Index is greater than or equal to 60.00 %, then the Redemption Amount will be:
	• \$100 + (\$100 × Percentage Change)
	If the Percentage Change in the Index is zero or positive and less than 60.00% , then the Redemption Amount will be:
	• \$100 + (\$100 × Booster Amount)
	If the Percentage Change in the Index is negative , then the Redemption Amount will be: • \$100 + (\$100 × Percentage Change)

Initial Estimated Value:	The initial estimated value of the Securities as of February 2, 2017 was \$95.65 per Security, which is less than the price to the public and is not an indication of the actual profit to the Bank or its affiliates. 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SAMPLE CALCULATIONS OF REDEMPTION AMOUNT

The examples set out below are included for illustration purposes only. The levels of the Index used to illustrate the calculation of the payment at maturity are not estimates or forecasts of the Initial Index Level and Final Index Level on which the calculation of the Percentage Change, and in turn the Redemption Amount, will depend. All examples assume that a holder of the Securities has purchased Securities with an aggregate Principal Amount of \$100 and that no Extraordinary Event has occurred. All dollar amounts are rounded to the nearest whole cent.

Example #1 — Calculation of the Redemption Amount where the Percentage Change is negative

Assuming that the Initial Index Level is 908.52 and the Final Index Level is 272.56, the Redemption Amount would be calculated as follows:

Initial Index Level = 908.52

Final Index Level = 272.56

Percentage Change = (272.56 - 908.52) / 908.52 = -0.7000 or -70.00%

Since the Percentage Change is negative, the Redemption Amount is calculated as follows:

Redemption Amount = $$100 + ($100 \times -70.00\%) = 30.00

In this example, the Redemption Amount results in a loss on the Principal Amount equivalent to an annually compounded loss rate of 19.66%.

Example #2 — Calculation of the Redemption Amount where the Percentage Change is negative

Assuming that the Initial Index Level is 908.52 and the Final Index Level is 863.09, the Redemption Amount would be calculated as follows:

Initial Index Level = 908.52

Final Index Level = 863.09

Percentage Change = (863.09 - 908.52) / 908.52 = -0.0500 or -5.00%

Since the Percentage Change is negative, the Redemption Amount is calculated as follows:

Redemption Amount = $$100 + ($100 \times -5.00\%) = 95.00

In this example, the Redemption Amount results in a loss on the Principal Amount equivalent to an annually compounded loss rate of 0.93%.

Example #3 — Calculation of the Redemption Amount where the Percentage Change is zero or positive and less than 60.00%

Assuming that the Initial Index Level is 908.52 and the Final Index Level is 953.95, the Redemption Amount would be calculated as follows:

Initial Index Level = 908.52

Final Index Level = 953.95

Percentage Change = (953.95 - 908.52) / 908.52 = 0.0500 or 5.00%

Since the Percentage Change is zero or positive and less than 60.00%, the Redemption Amount is calculated as follows:

Redemption Amount = \$100 + (\$100 × 60.00%) = \$160.00

In this example, the Redemption Amount provides a return on the Principal Amount equivalent to an annually compounded rate of return of 8.92%.

Example #4 — Calculation of the Redemption Amount where the Percentage Change is greater than or equal to 60.00%

Assuming that the Initial Index Level is 908.52 and the Final Index Level is 1,544.48, the Redemption Amount would be calculated as follows:

Initial Index Level = 908.52

Final Index Level = 1,544.48

Percentage Change = (1,544.48 - 908.52) / 908.52 = 0.7000 or 70.00%

Since the Percentage Change is greater than or equal to 60.00%, the Redemption Amount is calculated as follows:

Redemption Amount = $$100 + ($100 \times 70.00\%) = 170.00


In this example, the Redemption Amount provides a return on the Principal Amount equivalent to an annually compounded rate of return of 10.13%.

GRAPHICAL DESCRIPTION OF THE PAYMENT AT MATURITY

The graph set out below is included for illustration purposes only. The Index levels used to illustrate the calculation of the payment at maturity are not estimates or forecasts of the Initial Index Level and Final Index Level on which the calculation of the Percentage Change, and in turn the Redemption Amount, will depend. This graph shows a limited range of hypothetical returns on the Index and is intended to be representative of that range only. Returns on the Index not shown on the graph are still possible to achieve and the corresponding returns on the Securities should be calculated using the formulas set out in the Pricing Supplement. This graph demonstrates what the return on the Securities will be for a specific return on the Index. There can be no assurance that any specific return will be achieved. All examples assume that a holder of the Securities has purchased Securities with an aggregate Principal Amount of \$100 and that no Extraordinary Event has occurred. The minimum payment at maturity is \$1.00.
